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Dear colleagues,

I am so pleased to be welcoming you for this year's Australian Chairs and Secretaries of Academic Boards and Senates Conference. The focus of this year's conference is engaging with the various changes and challenges that have confronted the university sector in 2020. We have a mix of panel sessions featuring colleagues from within the Australian Chairs and Secretaries group discussing their strategies for handling matters of common interest, and expert speakers sharing their knowledge on their specialist subjects.

The panel on academic integrity will include an update from TEQSA on the scope and activities of the new Higher Education Integrity Unit. TEQSA's new CEO will take this opportunity to introduce himself to you as well. We also welcome back Associate Professor Cath Ellis from UNSW for some thoughts on contract cheating during COVID-19.

The expert speakers on Tuesday are Tim Payne, Director of Higher Education Policy and Projects at the University of Sydney, who will talk about some of the significant Federal Government higher education policy changes in 2020, and Dr Gwilym Croucher, from the Melbourne Centre for the Study of Higher Education, who will give a presentation on potential effects of the pandemic on university governance. On Wednesday, Professor Mike Kyrios, Director of the Orama Institute for Mental Health and Wellbeing, will speak about student mental health during the pandemic.

Academic risk management was a popular topic in the pre-conference survey, and a panel of colleagues from Charles Sturt University will be joining us on Wednesday to share their journey in setting up and implementing an academic risk management working group.

The annual sector survey of Academic Boards/Senates was once again run in 2020, and we will hear about some of the trends and insights from this year's data.

In recognition of the fact that not everyone can attend both days of the conference, we have split the regular "hot topics" session into two shorter periods, one on each day. We are once again featuring short presentations as a starting point for the discussion, but please feel free to raise any further points of interest on the day.

Although we are unable to meet in person this year, we felt it was of the first importance to create an avenue for online discussion and sharing of knowledge. As such, you will notice that we have punctuated the conference with "break and chat" sessions. We hope that you take advantage of these short, unfacilitated Zoom room gatherings to catch up with a few colleagues from across the sector.

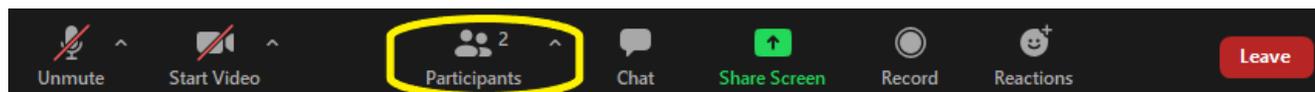

### Zoom protocol during the webinar

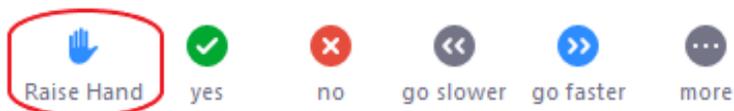
As with a face-to-face conference, we ask that you save your questions to the end of the session or presentation.

At the end of the session or presentation, please indicate that you would like to speak by using the “raise hand” function on Zoom.

The “raise hand” function can be found by clicking the icon labelled “Participants” at the bottom centre of your computer screen:



This will open the participants window on the right of your screen, and in the menu at the bottom of the participants window, you will be able to select the “raise hand” icon:



The Chair will indicate when you are able to ask your question.

We suggest that attendees keep their videos off and microphones on mute unless asking a question.

### Break and chat sessions

In the break and chat sessions, attendees will be allocated into Zoom breakout rooms at random. We would encourage you all to grab a cup of tea or coffee and have a quick chat to your colleagues from other institutions.

These breakout rooms are intended to be a virtual equivalent of bumping into someone in the line for coffee at a face-to-face conference, and they will not be moderated or recorded. Participants are welcome to use these sessions to discuss whatever topics take their fancy – the conversation does not have to be related to the conference business.
